Thorndon Bowls Club

Ancient History!-but now within living memory.

As promised in the last edition I have tried to identify some of the bowlers mentioned in the Newspaper reports using the 1939 Register. To explain what this is I have copied from the National Archive introduction...

When and why the Register was compiled

The 1939 Register was taken on 29 September 1939. The information was used to produce identity cards and, once rationing was introduced in January 1940, to issue ration books. Information in the Register was also used to administer conscription and the direction of labour, and to monitor and control the movement of the population caused by military mobilisation and mass evacuation.

What and who the Register records

The 1939 Register was designed to capture the details of every member of the civilian population on a specific date – military personnel were not recorded. It contains details of around 40 million people, recorded in more than 65,000 volumes (transcript books).

While the 1939 Register is not a census, it is arranged along similar lines and includes similar, if less detailed, information. It does, however, show exact dates of birth where census returns simply give a person's age.

...and as previously mentioned there are no Census records for 1931 or 1941. The 1921 Census should be released in January 2022 under the 100 year rule.

On to the bowlers of 1939- an easy one to start with was Ribbons who it turns out was the Police Officer living in Wetheringsett with his wife and two children-Sydney and Ruby. John W Coy was at Poplar Farm Thorndon and RR Cracknell lived at Rishangles Lodge although there is another R Cracknell in Hestley Green. Albert Bailey was at the Post Office with his son Edward and another child who because of the rules covering age and time has redacted information! Now with the H. Everson I do not know whether this is Horace or Herbert-but they both lived in the High Street. A Charles Alderton was in Rose Cottage in The Street with his wife Alice. A possible for F Rush was Frederick who lived at Winfields Farm Occold. And the last one I am reasonably confident with is Edward Brock who lived in Laundry Cottage. The biggest disappointment is that I cannot track down a Miss Roper in or near to Thorndon so unless someone else can help I am stumped.

These people were-in no particular order-Master Carpenter, Farmer, Post Master, Police Officer, Master Boot Maker-and Special Constable, a Horseman on a farm, a bricklayer and a labourer.

Absolute certainty about some of these but questions about the accuracy of others remains!! Please forgive me if I have it wrong-and do let me know!

You may recall from earlier in the Bowls Club history that the Tydeman family were very involved in the club so this must have been a sad time for many. This from the Diss Express in February 1940.

In August 1941 Messrs Brock and Bailey organised a bowls drive and raised 'over £8' in aid of the Comforts for the Sailors Fund, the winners being Mr R Cracknell, Mr Everson and Mrs Beare and Mrs Claborn. I cannot find a trace of these two ladies-or even the family name does not appear within a twenty mile radius.

In October 1942 the 'Ladies of Thorndon Bowls Club' ran a whist drive at Stanwell Lodge in aid of the Lord Lieutenant's Suffolk War Fund, especially for the Prisoners of War and Missing. £11 was raised and Mr Bailey was the M.C. with the prizes donated by the ladies themselves.

In an edition of a 1949 Diss Express more sad news with the death of Mr Cook. Within the obituary is a phrase which goes towards explaining why, besides the war, there are so few references to the Bowls Club in the 1940's. The phrase 'now defunct Thorndon Club' appears near the end-
